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INTRODUCTION

- *This document presents the actual results for 15 select CUs for the month of May 2026 (a) of Fiscal Year 2026. The actual liquidity position is now a part of the Month End Component Unit 1(C) Report published by The Puerto Rico Department of the Treasury ("Hacienda").*
- *Receipts include revenues collected from operations, intergovernmental receipts (General Fund appropriations and funds transferred between public corporations and municipalities from Central Government), disaster relief receipts (federal emergency funds, insurance related to hurricanes Irma, Maria, and Fiona, together with other disasters), as well as other federal funds.*
- *Disbursements include operating payments (e.g. payroll and related costs, purchased services, professional services, transportation expenses, etc.), disaster relief disbursements (e.g. expenditures related to the damages caused from hurricanes Irma, Maria, and Fiona, together with other disasters), and capital expenditures.*

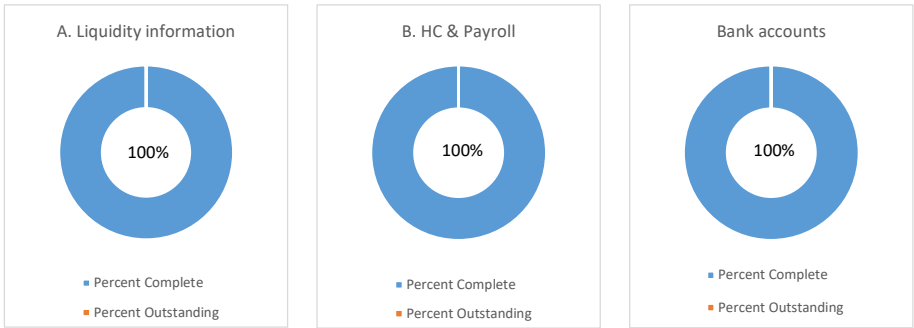

ORIL	Office for Dairy Industry Regulation: an administrative agency attached to the Department of Agriculture. Its primary objective is achieving excellent quality of milk in sufficient quantity to meet local demand at a fair price for the consumer, while guaranteeing reasonable benefits to producers, processors and distributors.
PayGo	Puerto Rico pension system that is funded through a pay-as-you-go system pursuant to Act 106-2017. Retirement benefits expenses of covered government employers are paid by the central government and reimbursed by the employers, with such funds received by the TSA.

Room Tax Waterfall Disbursements	Act No. 272, as amended by Act No. 23 in 2008 and Act No. 98 in 2016, defines a formula for distribution of room tax collections made by the Company. This statutory formula is subject to emergency legislation and related executive orders.
SBA	The U.S. Small Business Administration is a United States government agency that provides support to entrepreneurs and small businesses.
Slot Machine Waterfall Disbursements	Pursuant to Act No. 24, the Company must distribute collections from slot machine operations to two groups: Group A (hotels) and Group B (Hacienda, the University of Puerto Rico (UPR), and the Company's General Fund). The mandatory annual amount for distribution is \$119.0M to be allocated to Group A (34%) and Group B (66%). After the \$119.0M is deducted from total slot machine collections after operating costs, any excess is distributed to Group A (60%) and Group B (40%). Within Group B, Act No. 24 allocates the total distribution amount to the following Gov't entities: Hacienda (15.15%), UPR (45.45%), and the Company's General Fund (39.40%). While there is a fixed component of the distribution equation (mandatory fund), annual distributions are largely variable and increase given higher collections in slot machine revenues (excess fund).
SIFC	Puerto Rico State Insurance Fund Corporation, a public corporation and a component unit of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico; also see "Fondo".
SRF	Special Revenue Fund.
Title III	An in-court proceeding created by the United States Congress to allow U.S. states and territories, including Puerto Rico, to file for benefits similar to bankruptcy protection and a restructuring plan through PROMESA.
Tourism	Tourism Company of Puerto Rico, a public corporation and a component unit of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico.
Transfers (To)/From Restricted Account	Funds put aside by component unit(s) to fund capital expenditures and other reserve requirements.
TSA	Treasury Single Account, the Commonwealth's main operational bank account (concentration account) in which a majority of receipts from Governmental funds are deposited and from which most expenses are disbursed. TSA receipts include tax collections, charges for services, intergovernmental collections, the proceeds of short- and long-term debt issuances and amounts held in custody by the Secretary of the Treasury for the benefit of the Commonwealth's fiduciary funds. A portion of the revenues collected through the TSA corresponds to the General fund. Other revenues include federal funds and special revenues conditionally assigned by law to certain agencies or public corporations that flow through the TSA.
Unrestricted Bank Cash Balance Roll Forward	A roll forward of cash on the Component Unit's unencumbered and unreserved cash balance, and can be used for any purpose.

The variance is primarily attributable to prior year capital expenditures of (\$64.2M) related to the Aguadilla Airport project and higher than projected operating disbursements of (\$11.5M). These were partially offset by favorable variances in other receipts of \$37.2M, mainly from federal CapEx funding.

Operating disbursements are (\$7.4M) above plan as well as transfers to restricted bank accounts for (\$18.9M).

PRITA Commentary:	Favorable net cash flow of \$16.2M versus the Liquidity Plan was primarily due to \$23.5M in governmental appropriations, \$9.0M in operating receipts and lower than expected disbursements of \$3.1M, which include \$0.1M in operating expenses and \$2.6M in CapEx disbursements. This was partially offset by lower than projected receipts from various federal programs for (\$19.4M).

FONDO Commentary:	Favorable net cash flow of \$170.6M was primarily driven by higher than projected premium collections, which exceeded the Liquidity Plan by \$108.6M. Operating disbursements show a favorable variance of \$66.5M, mainly driven by \$36.0M in payroll, \$26.8M in claims-related disbursements net of (\$17.9M) in contributions to other governmental entities . This was partially offset by (\$15.3M) for uncleared checks.

This is partially offset by a favorable variance of \$422M in prescription rebates and \$165M in federal matching funds.

PBA Commentary:	Unfavorable net cash flow variance of \$12.9M when compared to the Liquidity Plan was driven by higher than projected disaster-related disbursements of (\$20.1M), an unfavorable variance in intergovernment receipts of (\$17.0M), and an unfavorable variance of (\$2.4M) in transfers to non-operating accounts for the POA. This was partially offset by higher than projected FEMA receipts of \$17.4M of which \$14.9M are for Working Capital Advance (RFCA) and higher than projected operating receipts of \$9.1M.

The variance was mainly due to lower than projected inflows from operating receipts of (\$4.3M), higher than projected operating disbursements of (\$5.5M) and FEMA spending of (\$4.8M). This was partially offset by lower than projected net CapEx spend of \$2.1M.

PRIDCO Commentary:

The net cash flow variance of (\$1.7M) versus Liquidity Plan is mainly due to a (\$8.9M) variance in total receipts which are lower than plan mostly on non-operating receipts (sales and FEMA deposits). This is offset by a \$6.6M positive variance in total disbursements with \$4.9M related to CapEx and \$3.9M in PRIICO mortgage payments, which are below plan at this date. Bondholder payments show (\$1.4M) over plan.

HFA Commentary:

Favorable net cash flow variance of \$4.8M versus the Liquidity Plan, driven primarily by higher than projected net movement of disaster relief funds of \$77.0M under the CDBG program, higher than expected intragovernmental receipts of \$62.9M, and lower than expected operating disbursements \$24.6M. These were partially offset by higher than projected net balance sheet disbursements of (\$146.8M) and lower than projected net federal fund activity of (\$12.5M).

Tourism Commentary:

Unfavorable net cash flow versus Liquidity Plan of (\$11.9M) was driven by higher than expected operating disbursements of (\$48.5M), which include a (\$22.0M) variance in media ads and a (\$25.3M) variance in other operating payments. This negative variance is offset by \$21.7M in total receipts above plan which include a variance of \$15.4M in room taxes.

AAFAF Commentary:

Net cash flow is \$18.4M favorable versus the Liquidity Plan, primarily due to lower than projected professional service expenses of \$16.3M, payroll and related costs of \$2.0M, and all other operating disbursements of \$2.0M. There is also a positive variance in receipts of \$1.8M above plan mainly due a \$3.7M appropriation received for the ERP project. This was partially offset by higher than expected disbursements from non-operating activities of (\$3.2M) and capital expenditures of (\$0.5M).

Unfavorable net cash flow variance versus Liquidity Plan of (\$128.2M) was mainly due to lower than projected intergovernmental receipts of (\$57.4M), along with higher than projected operating disbursements of (\$39.4M), higher than expected transfers to restricted accounts of (\$20.1M), an unfavorable variance in total operating receipts of (\$6.0M), and higher than expected capital expenditures of (\$5.3M).

CCDA Commentary:

The net cash flow variance is unfavorable by (\$29.2M) when compared to the Liquidity Plan, primarily due to higher than projected operating disbursements of (\$35.7M), largely from (\$31.1M) in purchased services due to unbudgeted expenses, lower than projected operating receipts of (\$6.7M), higher than projected federally supported project expenses of (\$6.2M), and higher capital expenditures of (\$0.1M). The decrease was partially offset by favorable net transfers of \$11.5M, higher than expected other receipts of \$4.8M, higher than expected intergovernmental receipts of \$3.1M, and higher than expected disaster-related receipts of \$0.3M

ADEA Commentary:

The unfavorable net cash flow variance of (\$4.1M) compared to the Liquidity Plan was primarily driven by higher than projected operating disbursements of (\$4.8M) and net transfers to investment accounts of (\$13.6M). This unfavorable performance was partially offset by higher than projected operating receipts of \$12.5M, mainly from Coffee Market Making of \$11.6M and other receipts of \$2.7M, as well as higher General Fund appropriations of \$2.5M.

ACAA Commentary:

Operating net cash flow was \$41.0M favorable versus the Liquidity Plan, primarily driven by a \$11.9M favorable variance in operating disbursements, which includes \$5.1M in lower than expected payroll-related disbursements, lower claims-related disbursements of \$2.7M, and \$1.3M in contributions to other government entities. The favorable variance also includes higher than projected operating receipts of \$29.1M, primarily driven by other operating receipts of \$20.3M, which includes \$21.0M from a refund of undue administrative fees by the Dept. of the Treasury for years 2020-2025.

May YTD unrestricted cash decreased by (\$3.8M), from \$170.8M to \$167.0M. The decrease is primarily driven by operating disbursements totaling (\$90.3M), consisting mainly of (\$28.8M) in PayGo obligations, (\$18.6M) in payroll and related costs, and (\$17.4M) in purchased services, which include a (\$5.0M) advance payment for property insurance. Additionally, capital expenditures of (\$64.2M) related to prior fiscal year project commitments at the Aguadilla Airport further reduced available liquidity. These outflows were partially offset by total receipts of \$155.5M, comprised mainly of \$82.0M in operating receipts and \$78.9M in other receipts, of which \$45.0M are attributable to federal CapEx funding for the Aguadilla Airport, and \$17.8M for dredging works for the Port of Las Mareas.
